## ***A Slice of Americana; An Americana Celebration & Introspective***

On July 19, 2026—a bright and hot summer afternoon—Holy Way Presbyterian Church hosted another concert by the SaddleBrooke Winds and Strings. This performance, under the direction of Jesús Jáquez, featured a variety of compositions in homage to the United States 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Unlike other performances in which Jesús performed and conducted, this concert was unique and quaint.

The introduction to each piece by Jesús acquainted the audience with composers, music background, lyrics and year in which it was written. Each selection was highlighted by a series of audio-visual effects on a large screen, leading to an interesting, informative and entertaining performance.

The concert began with “Ino Olimpico,” a musical piece written by Greek composer Spiro Samaras, with lyrics from a poem by Kostis Palamas, officially adopted as the permanent anthem of the International Olympic Committee in 1958.

Next was “Shenandoah,” believed to have originated among river boatmen and fur traders traveling the Missouri and Mississippi rivers during the early 19<sup>th</sup> Century. “Shenandoah” most famously means “Daughter of the Stars,” and is linked to a Native American legend about the creation of the Shenandoah River and Shenandoah Valley “mirroring the morning stars in a mountain lake.” The multi-colored images of the Blue Ridge Mountains on two large screens provided a beautiful panoramic view of the Shenandoah Valley. Joan Baez, Pete Seeger, Harry Belafonte and Bruce Springsteen and others recorded this song. As a prop, Jesús reached for a fur cap or hat,

artfully put it on his head and resumed conducting.

Perhaps, most guests in attendance were familiar with “If I had a Hammer,” a song written by Pete Seeger, later a big hit performed by Peter, Paul and Mary, and many other musical groups. It was the era of popular folk music, mainly performed with acoustic instruments and splendid blending harmony.

The concert would not have been more interesting without some extemporaneous changes in attire by Jesús. While introducing Selections from “Phantom of the Opera,” he reached down to pick up a large, black cape and a partial white mask to cover the right-side of his cheek and eye. The response by the audience was immediate and punctuated with laughter and perhaps a few “Lap Slaps.” This legendary musical by Andrew Lloyd Webber set the record as the longest-running show on Broadway when it closed after 35 years.

After the dramatic sounds and effects in the previous selection, flautist Ann Pizzitolo took center stage with “Nice and Easy,” a pleasant, haunting, relaxed and jazzy melody. Her performance ended the first part of the concert, followed by an invitation by Jesús to partake of refreshments and delicious food prepared in the church parking lot by Derrick Cambell and Dee Karuhe—owners of Double D’s Jamaican Jerk Pit.

The second part of the program began with “When Johnny Comes Marching Home,” a famous popular song born during the American Civil War. This composition became a symbol (cont.)

for the return of loved ones from the war. Once more, before conducting, Jesús reached down to his right, picked up a black and white cap and paced it on his head in honor of the song's origins.

Likewise, in the ensuing compositions "Impressions on a Kentucky Folk Tune" and "Moonride," Jesús mixed details about them, with two more "costume changes." These compositions complemented the previous ones, to emphasize the varied collection of music, and folklore in our nation's founding.

The finale of this musical introspective was a series of themes from "Star Wars," a contemporary space-opera about heroes, villains and a mystical power called the "Force." John Williams composed the music for this popular and epic audio and visual masterpiece, which became a block buster movie.

As noted previously, Jesús paused briefly to introduce this piece, by picking up a large, dark grey cape with hood, reminiscent of the one worn by Darth Vader. Had he worn a helmet, Jesús might not have been able to conduct as he usually does—using smooth movements with both arms, swaying, bending in rhythm, totally engaged with his body, mind and spirit up, down, bodies swaying side-to-side, right or left foot tapping time. Others familiar with some of the songs were singing along, indicating they were "synchronized." This participatory gesture complemented the loud, punctuated applause, in praise of an outstanding performance—once again.

There was no encore though, only the announcement by Jesús, of his next career move. In characteristic humility, he expressed his love and appreciation to the many current and retired

professional musicians with whom he has worked up to now. He has taken advantage of an opportunity to pursue a Master's Degree in Conducting, at the University of Missoula in Montana. For the past three years, Jesús has been Director and Conductor for the SaddleBrooke Winds and Strings. He has also served as Music and Choir Director at Holy Way, conducting and performing solo or with his wife, Annalisia. On many occasions, he has proven his versatility on multiple wind instruments.

Holy Way Presbyterian Church has been blessed by two gifted professional musicians who shared their passion for music unselfishly. They are exponents of the transformative power of music, through their mutual performances in different venues. Surely, they will do likewise in their new surroundings, with the same spirit and energy. "Some people come into our lives, leave footprints in our hearts, and we are never the same."—Franz Schubert.

## ***The Ebb and Flow of Life—from Andante to Presto***

There are stories about people overcoming major challenges, setbacks or unexpected change. Today, Holy Way—*The Church by the Side of the Road*, honors the presence and departure of a gifted young man, who has shared his musical talents unselfishly. He and his wife, Annalisia, came to this church at a crucial time for a congregation seeking recovery from a loss in leadership. Life teaches us valuable lessons about loss, and in the most adverse set of circumstances, we seek deliverance from a Higher power.

Despite the gap between the departure of one spiritual leader and the temporary guidance of another, Holy Way welcomed a young couple endowed with musical gifts they willingly offered to give voice to God Almighty. Members of this church, visitors who commute from other parts of the country and visitors alike, soon discovered what we might interpret as “Divine Intervention.” Welcoming Jesús to take over as Music and Choir Director at Holy Way, proved to be a “Godsend,” considering the history of having a former musical director working closely with another talented and experienced, professional artist: Dr. Astrid Chan. The combined musical training and inherent musical gifts of Astrid and Jesús meshed well, even with a small number of singers. Their dedication, passion for music and servant leadership became evident, through an eclectic selection of choral and instrumental music.

On several occasions, Holy Way has hosted a series of concert performances and piano recitals, which have been outstanding. These musical offerings have given young boys and girls an opportunity to expand their musical training and provide listeners superb entertainment.

Such commitment to the pursuit of excellence in music by Astrid, Jesús and Annalisia is inspirational, which could be related to an increase in attendance. Acknowledging their professional musical gifts is not enough; we must take into account the time, effort, sacrifice and discipline required to become proficient as a singer or instrumentalist. Aside from being experienced professional musicians, they have demonstrated their capacity to engage with singers who might not have similar musical training or experience. To date, Holy Way is fortunate to have a small group of dedicated people who love to sing and enjoy sharing their talents with others, who often are winter visitors. It is not unusual to hear people admit they go to church to feel closer to God, if a church has a choir.

Jesús, you and Annalisia depart from this corner of the Great Sonoran Desert to the northern climes of Montana, one more step in your evolving adventurous spirit. You do so, because you are endowed with leadership qualities. You have shown your capacity to undertake numerous tasks demanding different abilities, patience and commitment. You have conducted yourself (pardon the pun), with aplomb. This congregation, relatives, friends and strangers, have witnessed your energy, passion and dedication to vocal and instrumental music. You are blessed and endowed with extraordinary musical artistry, which you continue to share with others. Anyone who has seen and heard you perform on a variety of musical instruments, or seen you conduct, has responded with joy and perhaps a few tears. There is much more to add to this humble tribute to you and your beloved wife and musical twin, as you prepare to leave a place where you have evolved to a higher realm: a path which will “conduct” you to an

abundance of wonderful opportunities, in furthering your respective professional careers: performing and conducting. In attempting to imagine how you interpret the impact of music in your life, I found something interesting, which I want to share with you.

Leonard Bernstein, a beloved composer and conductor, has an interesting and whimsical point of view about life and conducting: *I believe that man's noblest endowment is his capacity to change . . . Conducting is like making love to a hundred people at the same time.*

Your journey has been rife with unexpected challenges, which have taken you in different directions. You both have weathered them with remarkable strength of character and faith. Holy Way has witnessed these attributes and are beneficiaries of your benevolence and artistic gifts.

Elizabeth Appell in her poem *Risk*, frequently and mistakenly attributed to Anais Nin, befits the spiritual and musical journey you and Annalisa have shared: *And the day came when the risk to remain tight in a bud was more painful than the risk it took to blossom.*

Sometimes, we human beings face hardship, adversity and change, when we least expect them to occur. The manner in which we respond and/or react, will influence the outcome: favorable or detrimental. Somehow, we can overcome obstacles we consider insurmountable; but if we are willing to take the steps necessary to surmount them, we are more likely to reap the rewards of having done so.

Music has the power to transform our lives in a myriad of ways, whether it is through song or a lovely, enchanting melody. Holy Way is grateful and blessed to have been a part of your journey, one full of hope, peace, happiness and prosperity. Your dynamic, spirited and entertaining performances and conducting are memorable and magical moments. Surely, your training,

discipline, self-confidence, determination and passion for music will contribute to a successful career change in Montana. Furthermore, having the support and encouragement from your mother, siblings, relatives and special friends, has been vital in what you have accomplished thus far. We sing and pray for safe travels and an exciting, rewarding career path. So, let the people of Holy Way on Ajo Way, say "Amen!"

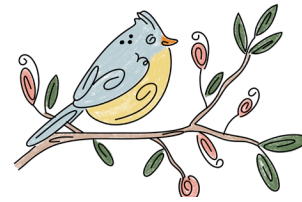


## The Holy Way Food Bank

Evelyn See, Director of the McKinney-Vento Program is organizing clothing for the children enrolled in her program.

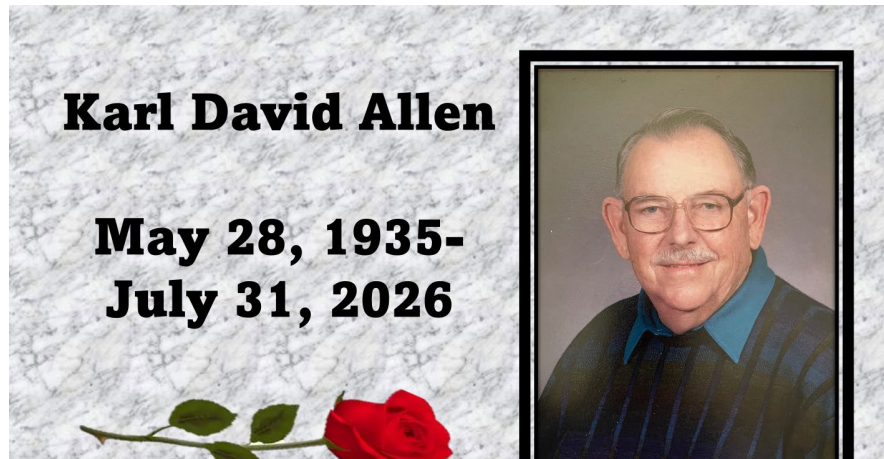
She is in the process of organizing a clothing closet for the families to use as a resource to keep the children adequately clothed.

I'll always be with you."

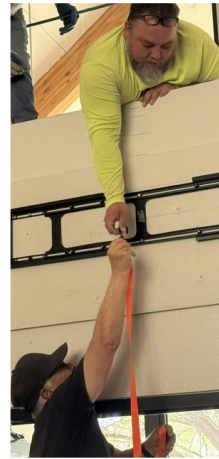

We, who are still here, say "¡Siempre Presente!"

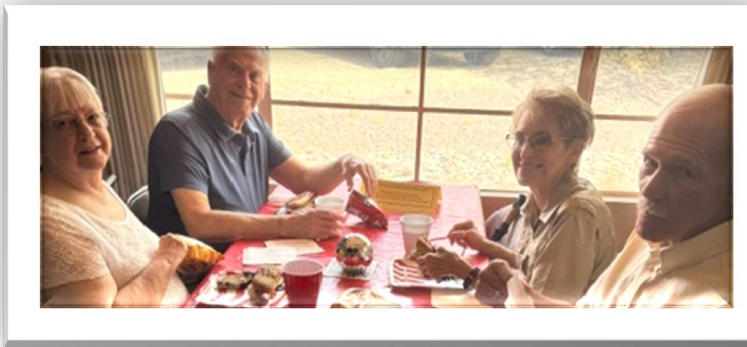
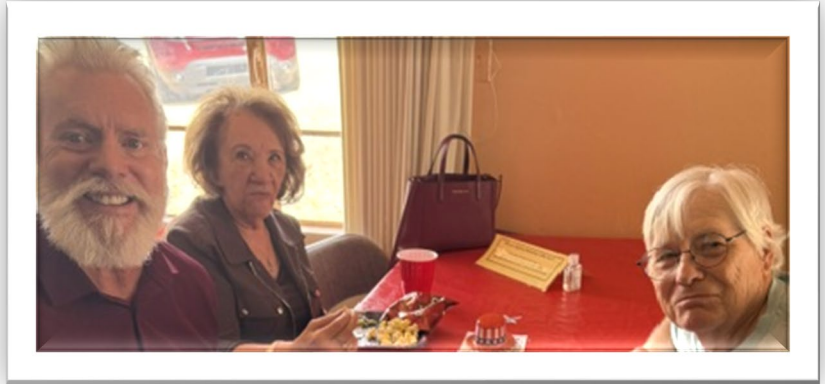
